(Nigeria) A recent poll of Nigerians shows that 57% of Nigerians have bought Petrol above the official price of N97 within a range of N100 –N130 per litre. This disparity is particularly seen in cities outside Lagos and Abuja. 70% of the South East Consumers buy their product from Independents not Major marketers; lastly 54% of Nigerians have attributed the huge disparity in the price to non-monitoring of the filling stations by the government. Most of them (52%) are informed in general, and 17% are well informed. Easter is one of the most important religious holidays of the year for many Christians – a time to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. According to a 2010 Pew Research Center survey, roughly half (48%) of Christians in the U.S. say they believe that Christ will definitely (27%) or probably (20%) return to earth in the next 40 years. 269-11 **D.C. Metro Area Again Leads U.S. in Economic Confidence** ([Click for Details](#))

Residents of the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area expressed the most confidence in the U.S. economy among the largest 50 metro areas in 2012, as they did in 2011. The D.C. metro area had a Gallup Economic Confidence Index score of 5 in 2012, up from -20 in 2011. Three of the 50 largest metro areas had positive scores on the Gallup Economic Index last year, while none had positive scores in 2011. Residents of Jacksonville, Fla., had the lowest economic confidence of this group in 2012, with a score of -28, followed closely by residents of Riverside, Calif. ([Gallup USA](#))

269-13 **Americans Want More Emphasis on Solar, Wind, Natural Gas** ([Click for Details](#))

No fewer than two in three Americans want the U.S. to put more emphasis on producing domestic energy using solar power (76%), wind (71%), and natural gas (65%). Far fewer want to emphasize the production of oil (46%) and the use of nuclear power (37%). Least favored is coal, with about one in three Americans wanting to prioritize its domestic production. Well under half of Americans (34%) think that temperatures in their local area have been warmer than usual this winter -- compared with 79% who reported warmer temperatures last year. The rest say temperatures have been the same (45%) or colder than usual (19%). 
#### **Few Conservatives View the Roberts Court as Conservative**




As the Supreme Court prepares to hear arguments on two same-sex marriage cases, and with several other high-profile cases on its docket, the court's favorability rating remains close to an all-time low.

**Supreme Court's Favorable Rating Little Changed**



**Partisan Divide in Favorable View of Supreme Court**



A national survey by the Pew Research Center, conducted March 13-17 among 1,501 adults, finds that 52% view the court favorably, while 31% view it unfavorably. Those ratings have changed only modestly since last July, shortly after the court's ruling to uphold most of the Affordable Care Act.

Republicans' views of the court, which tumbled 18 points following the court's ruling on the health care law, have rebounded somewhat in the current survey. Nearly half of Republicans (47%) have a favorable



opinion of the Supreme Court, up from 38% last July, but still lower than the 56% who viewed the court positively prior to its decision on the health care law.

By contrast, Democrats' impressions of the court have slipped since last July, from 64% to 56%. Independents' views of the court have changed little during this period. About half of independents (52%) continue to have a favorable impression of the court.

### Little Agreement on Supreme Court's Ideological Leanings

The public continues to have mixed perceptions of the Supreme Court's ideology. A plurality (40%) now say the court is middle of the road, while 24% say it is liberal and about the same share (22%) says it is conservative.

But conservative Republicans and liberal Democrats have very different impressions of the ideology of the Roberts Court. About as many conservative Republicans say the Supreme Court is liberal (45%) as middle of the road (39%). Very few conservative Republicans, just 9%, say the court is conservative.

Nearly half of liberal Democrats (48%) say the Supreme Court is conservative; 31% say it is middle of the road and just 15% view the court's ideology as liberal. Both overall public views of the court's ideology as well as the partisan and ideological differences in those views are little changed since 2012.

#### KEY STATISTICS

- 1- Number of Surveys (*a selection on key political and social issues*):  $\approx$  6,805 polls during the period 2007-2013
- 2- Subjects of Interest (*we have made a list of 125 subjects, further grouped into 9 broad categories, namely: **Governance**, **Globalization** (inclusive of global economic issues) **Global Conflicts** (conflict zones), **Global leaders** (USA and Emerging powers), **Global Environment**, **Family**, **Religion**, and **other miscellaneous***)
- 3- Number of **countries** covered by one or more surveys:  $\approx$  178 during the period 2007-2013
- 4- Number **polling organizations** whose polls have been cited:  $\approx$  358 during the period 2007-2013
