

(Nigeria) Latest poll results released by NOI Poll have revealed that almost 9 in 10 Nigerians (86%) do not have any form of insurance cover. The results have also indicated that Vehicle/Car insurance (63%) is the most commonly purchased insurance cover, and Insurance companies (42%) and agents (41%) are the key channels of insurance purchase. 
291-13 The black-white and urban-rural divides in perceptions of racial fairness (Click for Details)

A recent Pew Research Center survey asked Americans of all races how black people are treated relative to whites by the police, the court system and other institutions in their community. The results show a large and consistent black-white gap in perceptions, with blacks far more likely than whites to say African Americans are treated less fairly than whites. (Pew Research Center)

291-14 U.S. Small-Business Owners' Capital Spending Plans Brighten (Click for Details)

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U.S. small-business owners' capital spending intentions have been trending upward this year; the 26% who now say they are planning to increase spending is up from 20% in the end of 2012. Still, business owners aren't yet as optimistic about their capital spending as they were prior to the recession. From 2003 to early 2008, owners were much more likely to say they were planning to increase rather than decrease capital spending. Today, they are about equally as likely to say they will decrease it as increase it. (Gallup USA) August 29, 2013

As Newtown, Conn., students begin classes for the new school year, more than eight months after last December's massacre of 26 teachers and children there, U.S. parents of school-aged children appear to be no more at ease than they were immediately after the incident. Thirty-three percent of K-12 parents say they fear for their oldest child's safety at school, unchanged from last December, and higher than the 25% at the start of the 2012-2013 school year. 291-16 Americans Who Hate Their Jobs Are More Likely to Smoke (Click for Details)

(USA) Americans who are emotionally disconnected from their work and workplace, or "actively disengaged," are slightly more likely to smoke than those who are "engaged" or "not engaged" on the job. Eighteen percent of actively disengaged workers smoke vs. 15% of engaged or not engaged employees. (Gallup USA) August 29, 2013

291-17 U.S. Workers Say Their Wages Rose Over Past Five Years (Click for Details)

Almost five years since the onset of the global financial crisis, a majority of American workers say they are making a lot (28%) or a little (30%) more money than they were five years ago. Another 28% say they are making less money, including 18% who say "a lot" less. Fourteen percent of workers say they are making the same amount of money as five years ago. (Gallup USA)

291-18 As in 1963, Blacks Still Feel Disadvantaged in Getting Jobs (Click for Details)

Sixty percent of U.S. blacks believe whites have better chances than blacks to get jobs for which they are qualified, while 39% believe whites and blacks have equal opportunities. Blacks' views are more positive now than they were in 1963, when 74% thought whites had better chances at jobs. Blacks have felt disadvantaged versus whites in terms of job hiring in all but a couple of instances over the last 50 years. (Gallup USA) August 28, 2013

President Barack Obama's job approval is more fluid among certain groups of Americans than among others. Of the major subgroups, U.S. Hispanics' approval of Obama has shown the greatest variation during his more than five years in office, with quarterly approval averages ranging from a low of 49% to a high of 80%. (Gallup USA)

291-20 In U.S., Economic Confidence Stuck in Negative Territory (Click for Details)

Americans' confidence in the economy is heading further into negative territory after almost reaching the net positive range in late May and early June. Gallup's Economic Confidence Index, at -14 last week, remains down from the all-time weekly high of -3 measured in the week ending June 2, and has been at or below -10 since the week ending July 14. (Gallup USA)

Blacks are somewhat less satisfied now (41%) than they were earlier this summer (47%) with the way blacks are treated in the U.S. By contrast, their views of how other groups are treated are no worse today than they were in June and early July. (Gallup USA)

(USA)A month after Florida neighborhood watchman George Zimmerman was acquitted on all charges in the shooting death of a black teen named Trayvon Martin, blacks are more likely than they were just prior to the July 13 verdict to believe new civil rights laws are needed to reduce discrimination against blacks. An August Gallup poll finds 61% of blacks saying such laws are needed, up from 53% in a June-July poll. (Gallup USA)

As the U.S., its European allies and various Arab states in the Middle East consider military action against the Syrian regime of Bashar al-Assad for his alleged use of chemical weapons, Assad doesn't have many friends among neighbors in the region.

There is little public backing for the Syrian president from the mostly Sunni Arab publics in the Middle East, according to a Pew Research

Center survey conducted before the recent allegations of chemical



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weapons use. Only the Shia in Lebanon (91%) had a favorable view of the Syrian leader. (Assad comes from a family of Alawites, a branch of Shia Islam.)

Roughly nine-in-ten Lebanese Sunnis (92%), Israelis (91%) and Jordanians (90%) have a negative view of the Syrian leader, as do eight-in-ten Egyptians (81%) and Tunisians (81%) and seven-in-ten Turks (72%).

Even the Christians in Lebanon (63%) oppose Assad, despite the relative protection the Assad family has given the Christian community in Syria over the years.



The intensification of the conflict in Syria in the last year has not altered regional views of Assad. He was not liked in 2012 and he is not liked today.

Nor is Assad popular in Russia, a longtime ally of the Syrian regime and an opponent of outside intervention in the Syrian civil war. Just 27% of the Russian public support the Assad government. Most Russians (52%) have no opinion on the issue.

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

KEY STATISTICS

- 2- Subjects of Interest (we have made a list of 125 subjects, further grouped into 9 broad categories, namely: Governance, Globalization (inclusive of global economic issues) Global Conflicts (conflict zones), Global leaders (USA and Emerging powers), Global Environment, Family, Religion, and other miscellaneous
- 3- Number of countries covered by one or more surveys: ~ 178 during the period 2007-2013
- 4- Number polling organizations whose polls have been citied: ~358 during the period 2007-2013



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
