(Palestine) Three polls in 24 hours show Likud has received a serious boost, most likely from the Shalit deal with Hamas. A poll carried out by the Smith Institute for Globes gives Likud 33, while Labor chalks up 20 and Kadima gets 17. According to the poll, the nationalist / religious bloc, including the haredi parties, has 70 seats, five more than at present. (Smith Institute UK) October 27, 2011





(USA) Seventy-one percent of American workers are "not engaged" or "actively disengaged" in their work, meaning they are emotionally disconnected from their workplaces and are less likely to be productive. That leaves nearly one-third of American workers who are "engaged," or involved in and enthusiastic about their work and contributing to their organizations in a positive manner. This trend remained relatively stable throughout 2011. (Gallup USA)


Republicans and Democrats are sharply divided on the government's role in creating jobs in the United States. Republicans are more likely to say reduced government regulation and involvement will lead to more jobs, while Democrats focus more on government involvement such as funding infrastructure work. Similar percentages in both groups, however, say the best way to create more jobs is to stop sending work overseas. (Gallup USA)

Nearly 11 years after the 2000 presidential election brought the idiosyncrasies of the United States' Electoral College into full view, 62% of Americans say they would amend the U.S. Constitution to replace that system for electing presidents with a popular vote system. Barely a third, 35%, say they would keep the Electoral College. (Gallup USA)

Unemployment, as measured by Gallup without seasonal adjustment, was 8.3% for the 30 days ending Oct. 23 -- down sharply from 9.0% for the 30 days ending Sept. 4. Over the same period last year, Gallup's U.S. unemployment rate was steady or increasing, suggesting the lower unemployment Gallup has measured in recent weeks is not fully the result of seasonal hiring patterns. 





Among Egyptian adults





The lack of improvement in Egyptians' situations since **Mubarak's ouster** does not bode well for an interim government that is facing mounting criticism. The Supreme Council of the Armed Forces (SCAF) is under fire for its performance after clashes between military forces and protesters on Oct. 9 left 25 dead. A number of high-profile political players are calling for the SCAF to resign from the leading the country's daily affairs on all nonmilitary issues.

Despite these challenges, nearly all Egyptians (95%) say people can work hard and get ahead in their country. They are more likely to say this now than they were several years leading up to the revolution.

Implications

The progress of a revolution can't be audited like the performance of a company. However, one way to assess the evolution of change in Egypt is to ask people whether they are more or less able to acquire the rudimentary necessities of life. Although not conclusive in scoring the gains made by Mubarak's expulsion, these types of assessments are a good indicator of Egyptians' daily lives. Gallup surveys find many Egyptians struggling to afford food and more of them finding it difficult to get by. As such, many Egyptians may still be waiting to feel the

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positive effect of Mubarak's ouster on their daily lives. Gallup's data also show that Egyptians do believe they have a role to play in building a positive future for their nation, and hope that their hard work will pay off.

Survey Methods

Results are based on face-to-face interviews with 1,121 adults, aged 15 and older, conducted July 25-Aug.

1, 2011, in Egypt. For results based on the total sample of national adults, one can say with 95% confidence that the maximum margin of sampling error is ± 3.3 percentage points. Earlier surveys are based on face-to-face interviews with approximately 1,000 adults, aged 15 and older, in Egypt. For results based on the total sample of national adults in these surveys, one can say with 95% confidence that the maximum margin of sampling error ranges from ± 3.1 to ± 3.5 percentage points.



The margin of error reflects the influence of data weighting. In addition to sampling error, question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of public opinion polls.


