199-1 Majority Satisfied With Halt Of Negotiations And UN Bid (Click for Details)

A public opinion poll conducted by the Jerusalem Media and Communications Centre showed that the majority of respondents (51.2%) said they were satisfied with the decision of the Palestinian leadership to halt negotiations and resort to the United Nations while 15.1% said they were dissatisfied. (JMCC)

199-2 Before Violence, Egyptians Expected Fair, Honest Elections (Click for Details)

(Egypt) Before violence and political turmoil threw the first round of Egypt's parliamentary elections into doubt, Gallup surveys in September showed most Egyptians planned to vote (74%) and expected the elections to be fair and honest (71%). (Gallup USA)

199-3 Many Africans Lack Confidence in Honesty of Elections (Click for Details)

Despite their governments' efforts to hold credible elections over the past decade, residents in many sub-Saharan African countries are still skeptical about their electoral process. Across 19 countries Gallup surveyed in 2011 -- representing about 60% of individuals old enough to vote -- a median of 41% say they have confidence in the honesty of elections in their countries. Majorities in six countries express confidence. (Gallup USA)

199-4 Eight Out Of Ten People Want Independent Media (Click for Details)

Today is being called "Black Tuesday" as various organisations call for a protest against today's vote in parliament on the Protection of State Information Bill. Eightone percent of metro adults felt in that study that it is important to have independent TV and radio stations and newspapers so that people receive unbiased news. This was significantly higher than the figure of 73% obtained in a similar study five years ago. In the 2010 study, only 7% disagreed with the study whilst 12% gave a "don't know" response. Climate change and environmental issues are very much in the news as CoP 17 in Durban on 28 November approaches. A recent study found that 31% of metro adults are in denial, saying that climate change will NOT affect their lives very much, whilst 49% feel it WILL affect their lives, with a very high 20% giving a don't know response. 199-6 European Union: Internal Security (Multi-country survey) (Click for Details)

(EU) The main challenges to European security are economic and financial crises (34%), terrorism (33%), organised crime (21%) and poverty (18%). There is a wide variation across Europe in the proportions of respondents identifying each security challenge as an issue for their country - for instance 46 points separate the proportions mentioning economic/financial crises in Ireland and France, and 53 points separate Denmark and Latvia when it comes to mentioning terrorism as a threat to national security. However, the strength of this support for development aid has declined in the last year. The number of those who say that it is very important has dropped by 9 points from 45% in 2010. (UK) New online research from YouGov's London Omnibus reveals that the Oyster card is the payment option of choice for most Londoners with 76% owning one. The majority of Oyster owners use it at least once a week (71%) and just under a quarter use their Oyster card every single day (23%). (Yougov)

(Germany) Books, clothes and toys are the bestselling Christmas presents. Around 92% of Germans plan to spend an average of EUR 241 on Christmas presents this year, which is almost as much as in 2010. According to a current GfK study, retailers can expect sales volumes of EUR 13.7 billion for Christmas presents and shoppers intend to make online purchases significantly more often than last year. (Germany) Once again there was no uniform picture for consumer sentiment in Germany in November this year. While there was a significant rise in the willingness to buy, economic and income expectations recorded a decline. Following a revised value of 5.4 points in November, the overall indicator is forecasting a value of 5.6 points for December. (GFK)



Americans have grown a bit more critical over the past month of the methods used by Occupy Wall Street protesters; however, their overall views of the movement and position on its goals have not changed. The majority of Americans, 53%, say they neither support nor oppose the movement, while supporters continue to slightly outnumber opponents. (Gallup USA)


Forty-nine percent of Americans are feeling better about their financial situations these days, representing a continuing downturn from the average of 53% who were feeling better in mid-summer. The drop in Americans' positive attitudes about their finances in August occurred just after the congressional wrangling over the Aug. 2 debt ceiling deadline, suggesting that there may be a similarly negative impact from this week's failure of the super committee to reach its budget-cutting deadline. Many Americans continue to see the Mormon faith as unfamiliar and different. Newt Gingrich now leads all of his Republican presidential rivals in garnering positive image ratings from Republicans and Republican leaners nationwide -- marking a first for 2011. His +20 Positive Intensity Score gives Gingrich a sizable lead over Herman Cain, in second with +14, and Mitt Romney, in third with +11. (Gallup USA)

(USA) Upper-income Americans' economic confidence continued to improve during the first three weeks of November, with 70% saying the economy is "getting worse" -- sharply better than the 80% of August. However, upper-income Americans' negative views of the economy's direction have yet to drop to July's 66%, the level seen just before the end of the budget ceiling battle. (Gallup USA)

Politics Not a Favored Topic at America's Thanksgiving Table

This page is devoted to opinions of countries whose polling activity is generally not known very widely or where a recent topical issue requires special attention.

November 23, 2011

Most respondents expect family and personal issues to dominate the conversation during Thanksgiving dinner.

Politics will not be one of the main topics of conversation as Americans sit down for Thanksgiving dinner, a new Angus Reid Public Opinion poll has found.

In the online survey of a representative national sample of Americans who are

having thanksgiving dinner tomorrow, sevenin-ten respondents (70%) expect to talk about personal and family issues at the table. Practically half also foresee a discussion about sports (49%) and entertainment (49%), while

two-in-five (41%) believe the conversation will also touch on health. Only one third of diners (32%) say they will discuss politics during Thanksgiving dinner.

While there is no difference in the proportion of Democrats and Republicans who will talk about politics (34% for each), Republicans are more likely to expect a dialogue about personal and

family issues (76%) than Democrats (69%).

When asked which one of two chores they prefer to help out with when it comes to Thanksgiving dinner, a majority of Americans (61%) choose cooking, while two-in-five (39%) select cleaning up. Men are evenly split on the two chores (Cooking 51%, Cleaning up 49%), while women clearly prefer to cook (70%, compared to 30% for cleaning up).

Americans aged 18-to-34 (45%) are more likely to favor cleaning up to cooking than those aged 35-to-54 (35%) and those over the age of 55 (37%).

Methodology: From November 21 to November 22, 2011, **Angus Reid** Public Opinion conducted an online survey among 888 American adults who are having a Thanksgiving dinner tomorrow and are Springboard America panelists. The margin of error—which measures sampling variability—is +/- 3.3%. The results have been statistically weighted according to the most current education, age, gender and region Census data to ensure a sample representative of the entire adult population of the United States. Discrepancies in or between totals are due to rounding.



- 3- Number of countries covered by one or more surveys: ~ 178 during the period 2007-2011
- 4- Number polling organizations whose polls have been citied: ~ 160 during the period 2007-2011
